SOUL HAS WEIGHT, PHYSICIAN THINKS

Dr. Macdougall of Haverhill Tells of Experiments at Death.

LOSS TO BODY RECORDED

Scales Showed an Ounce Gone in One Case, He Says-Four Other Doctors Present.

BOSTON, March 10.-That the human soul has a definite weight, which can be determined when it passes from the body, is the belief of Dr. Duncan Macdougall, a reputable physician of Haverhill. He is at the head of a Research Society which for six years has been experimenting in With him, he says, have been this field. associated four other physicians.

Dr. Macdougall's object was to learn if the departure of the soul from the body was attended by any manifestation that could be recorded by any physical means. The chief means to which resort was made was the determination of the weight of a body before and after death.

The method followed was to p dying patient in bed upon one place a of the platforms of a pair of scales made ex-pressly for the experiments, and then to balance this weight by placing an equal weight in the opposite platform. These scales were constructed delicately enough be sensitive to a weight of less than to one-tenth of an ounce. every case ln after death the platform opposite the one in which lay the subject of the test fell suddenly, Dr. Macdougall says. The tigures on the dial index indicated the di-minishment in weight. Dr. Macdougall told of the results of his experiments as follows: "Four other physicians under my direc-tion made the first test upon a patient dying with tuberculosis. This man was one of the ordinary type of the usual American temperament, neither particularly high strung nor of marked phieg-matic disposition. We placed him, a few hours preceding death, upon a scale platform, which I had constructed and which was accurately balanced. Four hours later with five doctors in attendance he died. "The instant life ceased the opposite scale pan fell with a suddenness that was astonishing—as if something had suddenly lifted from the body. I been Immediately all the usual deduction. were made for physical loss of weight, and it was discovered that there was still a fuli ounce of weight unaccounted for. "I submitted another subject afflicted with the same disease and nearing death to the same experiment. He was a man of much the same temperament as the preceding patient and of about the same physical type. The same result happened at the passing of his life. The instant the heart ceased to beat there was the sudden and almost uncanny diminishment in weight. As experimenters, each physician ín attendance made figures of his own concerning this loss, and, at a consultation, these figures were compared. The unaccountable loss continued to be shown. "But this was less remarkable than what took place in the third case. The subject was that of a man of larger physbuild, with a pronounced sluggish ical-When life ceased, as the temperament. body lay in bed upon the scales, for a full minute there appeared to be no change in weight. The physicians waiting in the room looked into each other's faces silently, shaking their heads in the conviction that our test had failed. "Then suddenly the same thing hapthat had occurred in the other pened – There was a sudden diminution in cases. weight, which was soon found to be the same as that of the preceding experiments. "I believe that in this case, that of a phlegmatic man slow of thought and action, that the soul remained suspended in the body after death, during the minute that elapsed before it came to the con-sciousness of its freedom. There is no other way of accounting for it, and it is what might be expected to happen in a man of the subject's temperament. "Three other cases were tried, including that of a woman, and in each it was established that a weight of from onehalf to a full ounce departed from the body at the moment of expiration.'

IRISH GLORIFY EMMET

And Rhode Island's Governor Says There'll Be No Alliance with England.

The Majestic Theatre was crowded with Irishmen and Irishwomen last night, who joined in celebrating the one hundred and twenty-ninth anniversary of the birth of Robert Emmet. The exercises were held under the auspices of the Clan-Na-Gael of New York. John Quinn presided and Gov. James H. Higgins of Rhode Island made the principal address. Well-known Irish airs were sung, and the enthusiasm was intense.

Mr. Quinn expressed confidence in Ire-

Mr. Quinn expressed confidence in Ire-land's future, which is brighter to-day, he said, than in over a century. He looked forward to the time when Ireland would have a national university of her own. A century of hate, tyranny, and false-hood, Gov. Higgins said, had failed to tarnish the purity of Emmet's soul or to dim the lustre of his fame. The modern trial of Capt. Dreyfus, he added, when compared to that of Emmet was a model of correct judicial procedure. England, the Governor said, would look with favor on an Anglo-American alliance, but "she will look in vain." Far away is the day, he declared, when America will lend even an ear to her plea for sympathy and an alliance. Irishmen, he concluded, had succeeded in every land but Ireland, and they would have succeeded there had and they would have succeeded there had it not been for England's cruel and barbaric tyranny.
